ACCOMMODATIONS

A block of rooms has been reserved at the Omni-Biltmore Hotel, Kennedy Plaza, Providence, R. I. (401 421-0700). When calling for reservations, you must indicate that you are with the FCH'S Conference. Conference rates run from \$65.00 to \$119.00. The Omni-Biltmore is a 10-minute walk from the Library. Room reservations must be made directly with the hotel.

TRAVEL

The John Carter Brown Library is on the Brown University Green, adjacent to the corner of George and Brown Streets. Once you are on the Brown University campus, the Library is easy to find. The T. F. Green airport is 20 minutes away in Warwick and serves the Providence metropolitan area. Limousines depart frequently from the airport to the Omni-Biltmore Hotel and to the Brown campus. Fare is approximately \$7.00. Taxi fare is approximately \$23.00.

If it is more convenient to fly to Boston, a direct Bonanza bus can be taken to Providence from Boston's Logan Airport. The trip takes one hour and costs \$20 round-trip. Buses depart every hour and stop at the Omni-Biltmore Hotel in downtown Providence.

Providence is on the northeast corridor Amtrak line that runs from Virginia to Boston, and five or six trains arrive daily. For auto travel, I-95 connects Providence to Boston and New York.

WHAT TO WEAR

The weather in May is extremely *changeable*, and temperatures may range from 40 degrees to 90 degrees Fahrenheit.
